
Colorado Senate District 35 (2021)

Election Differentials:

The commission analyzed the results of eight recent elections, three of which are included here, and reported results in each district as the difference between the percent of votes cast for the Republican candidate and the percent of votes cast for the Democratic candidate. A positive differential means the Republican would have won in the district, and a negative differential means the Democrat would have won in the district.
